Notes from the Dean

HOPE EVERYONE HAD A WONDERFUL HOLIDAY season. Church musicians especially lead such hectic lives during the weeks leading up to Christmas that the Chapter Board does not even consider organizing a program for December. This year the "buzz" carried over from the November 19th concert at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Palo Alto of the music composed by the late David N. Johnson and performed by organist David Hatt, featuring baritone Stuart Duke and trumpeter Carole Klein. Those of us who enjoyed this concert were treated to many never-beforeheard compositions compiled by Dr. Johnson's daughter Teal Johnson. The concert was recorded, and the resulting CD will hopefully spark a publisher's interest in making the music available. We are fortunate to live in an area where we can attend concerts of such quality and sophistication.

Now that the new year has begun, we can look forward to our January 20th concert, *Millennia Too!*. This is an ensemble of our own Alison Luedecke on organ and Susan Barrett on oboe, oboe d'amore, and English horn. Alison and Susan have been playing together for about thirteen years. This program will be hosted by Jacques Littlefield at his Pony Tracks Ranch in Portola Valley, where he has a three-manual tracker-action Fisk instrument. Dr. Luedecke will play organ works of Bach, Brahms, and Vierne. The ensemble will perform some newer pieces including the world premiere of the Bay Area's own John Karl Hirten's composition for oboe d'amore and organ,

"Veni Creator Spiritus." I am looking forward to this varied program of old favorite composers balanced by modern ones.

February 10 Chapter Event: Sandra Soderlund Masterclasses

N FEBRUARY 10, 2007 Dr. Sandra Soderlund, Professor at Mills College, will come to All Saints' Episcopal Church in Palo Alto (Al Campbell, host) and lead a double masterclass. This is a change from the previously announced February Chapter event. Starting at 10:30 a.m. will be the young organists' masterclass. At noon we will break for lunch (on your own) on University Avenue. At 1 p.m. we will reconvene at All Saints' for the adult class, finishing up around 3:30 p.m.

Sandra is a gifted teacher and a number of local organists have enjoyed studying with her over the years. She just recently finished writing her new book, entitled *How Did They Play? How Did They Teach?* Her book is a comprehensive analysis of keyboard playing from the 1400's to the early 20th century. Dr. Soderlund has performed around the world including recent concerts at Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris and St. Bavo in Haarlem, The Netherlands in the summer of 2005.

The All Saints' instrument is a beautiful two-manual Flentrop organ which does especially well with Germanic literature of the Baroque, Classic, and early Romantic eras. Performers are encouraged to pick literature suitable to this instrument. The added bonus of a clavichord owned by Board member Rani Fischer may be available to try out as well!

REQUIESCAT IN PACE: JAMES RAYMOND GARNER, 1951-2006

With sadness we announce the death of James Raymond Garner, from heart failure while at home on his ship, the "Sea Wave." An accomplished concert organist, organbuilder, and church musician, he was also at various times a computer retailer, Dixieland jazz musician, and sea captain.

His initial organ studies were with Karl Bonawitz in Newport Beach, California. Bonawitz was a student of Pietro Yon and an organist at many famous theaters during the silent-movie era. Garner also studied with Justin Colyer, a former student of Virgil Fox. He quickly developed an expressive and flamboyant style of playing reminiscent of Fox.

He majored in organ performance at the University of Redlands, studying with Raymond Boese, and earned the Bachelor of Music Degree in 1974. Following graduation, he established an organbuilding, restoration, and maintenance firm, Raymond Garner & Co., which existed in various forms throughout his life. He was responsible for the construction and preservation of nine or more instruments, including a handheld portativ organ for the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. Ray's "magnum opus" was a three-manual Levi U. Stuart mechanical action organ that he resurrected from a Masonic hall in Sydney, Ohio and placed in St. John's Episcopal Church in San Bernardino, California, following three years of restoration. Unfortunately this instrument suffered water damage in a fire at the church and was subsequently placed in storage.

Following his installation of two restored organs in churches in Kalispell, Montana, Ray relocated there in 1982 with his wife Shauneen and daughter Sydney. He was an active musical force in Northwest Montana. He and Shauneen were among the six founding members of the Glacier Symphony and Chorale, and in the early years of that organization Ray could be found variously playing bassoon, tuba, percussion, singing tenor, or conducting. He was also a Dixieland jazz musician and played both piano and

sousaphone in several ensembles, performing in many jazz festivals throughout the West. In 1993 he and Karla West co-founded the Glacier Jazz Stampede, a festival which attracts dozens of Dixieland groups from across the country each year. Ray was a virtuosic ragtime pianist and specialized in the repertoire of Jellyroll Morton. During his years in Montana, Ray also owned Montana MicroSystems, a computer consulting firm.

In 1994 Ray moved to Denver to take the position of organist at the First Church of Christ, Scientist. An indication of his dedication is provided by the fact that he became a Christian Scientist practitioner for a period of time. He later also took the post of organist at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Denver, eventually becoming Associate Director of Music. He was the Logistics Director of the Denver National AGO convention in 1998.

In 2000 Ray moved to the Bay Area and became the Assistant Director of Music at St. Mary's Cathedral in San Francisco. He later moved on to St. Catherine of Siena R.C. Church in Martinez, St. Sebastian the Martyr R.C. Church in Greenbrae, and eventually to his final position, Music Director at St. Perpetua R.C. Church in Lafayette, California.

Early in 2006 he determined to purchase the historic tugboat "Sea Wave," berthed in Seattle. After arduous labor, he sailed it to Point Richmond, California where it is now docked. While in Seattle, he was spotted by a production company, which led to his (and "Sea Wave's") appearance in a Chevrolet commercial. At this point he became a member of the Screen Actor's Guild.

Mr. Garner will be remembered as a vibrant, exciting performer who specialized in French Romantic composers and who was also a talented improviser. He is survived by his mother Genevieve, wife Patrice, former wife Shauneen, and children Sydney, 27, Adrienne, 22, and Morgan, 17.

recital duo performs repertoire from Renaissance to modern, including premieres by contemporary American composers. Their performances explore the varied timbres of oboe, oboe d'amore, and English horn in concert with the broad range of pipe organ colors. Susan and Alison have a musical rapport born of over a decade of close collaboration, creating spontaneous and highly nuanced musical performances. The ensemble can be heard on two compact discs recorded in churches in San Diego: Paradise Found: Reflections for Oboes and Organ (All Souls Episcopal and St. Brigid's Catholic churches), and Transformations: 20th-Century Music for Organ and Other *Instruments* (works by Copland and Koetsier), recorded in St. Paul's Cathedral.
