At 3 p.m. or so, we will adjourn and walk next door to Messiah Lutheran Church and for another hour and a half enjoy the lovely three-manual Steiner-Reck organ therein until about 4:30 p.m. Messiah organist Catha Hall will be our host as we hear about, listen to, and play Messiah's organ, including its adjustable speed and ring-density zymbelstern with rotating star!

# "PIPES IN THE DESERT" —LAST CALL!—

The AGO Region IX Mid-Winter Conclave ("Pipes in the Desert") will be held in sunny Tucson, Arizona, January 20–24, 2008.

Among the featured organ recitalists are Paul Jacobs, chairman of the Organ Department at the Juilliard School in New York; Pamela Decker, composer, organist, and Professor of Organ and Theory at the University of Arizona; and Richard Elliott, Tabernacle Organist, Mormon Tabernacle Choir. In addition, there will be an opening hymn festival led by Michael Burkhardt and a recital by the chamber ensemble *Millennia Too!*.

The venues will feature organs by David McDowell/Pipe Organ Artisans of Arizona; Schoenstein; Quimby; Aeolian Skinner/Pipe Organ Artisans of Arizona; Schlicker; and Schantz.

A variety of workshops will also be offered at the Conclave. There are workshops on hymn-singing and playing; Bach performance practice at the organ; choral conducting; handbells in worship; Mexican organ culture; organ and instruments; presentation of the work in progress on the historic organ at St. John the Divine in New York City; organ music of Brahms; organ masterclass; accompaniment styles for leading congregational singing; children's choir techniques; and much more!

Two composers with anniversaries in 2008 will be featured in the workshops. Johannes Brahms (175th anniversary of his birth) will be presented in a workshop by Dr. John Brobeck focusing on Brahms' organ music. Organ music of Olivier Messiaen (100th anniversary of his birth) will be heard in the masterclass with Paul Jacobs.

# O Schoenstein Builds Four for New York City

Schoenstein & Co. of San Francisco is building four new organs for New York City. The first is for Christ and St. Stephen's Church, near Lincoln Center, where Nigel Potts is organist and choirmaster and Paul Jacobs is artist-in-residence. The three-manual, 17-rank organ in symphonic style will be entirely under expression with a double expressive division within the Swell. It will have a very distinctive, elaborately carved façade with decorated display pipes. The next two Schoenstein organs are for St. James' Church on the upper east side. The first instrument of two-manuals and 17 ranks will be installed in the gallery and will serve the Parish until the four-manual, 77-rank organ is installed in the chancel, at which time both instruments will be playable from either console. Davis Wortman is the director of music and organist and was formerly organist at Highland Park Presbyterian Church in Dallas, Texas where he supervised the installation of Schoenstein's first large symphonic organ. The fourth New York City Schoenstein will be in the teaching studio of Paul Jacobs in the newly renovated Juilliard School of Music campus at Lincoln Center. This three-manual, ten-rank organ has one unenclosed and two enclosed divisions and a complete range of modern playing aids. The instrument will be arrayed so that its component parts and mechanism can be viewed for instruction on the inner workings of pipe organs. (12/14/07 press release)

ipe Organ Encounters introduce young people to the pipe organ through instruction in organ playing, repertoire, history, design, and construction. These regional summer organ music institutes for teenage students provide private and group instruction in service playing and solo repertoire, opportunities to learn about the musical heritage of various religious denominations, and a chance for young musicians to meet others with similar interests. Basic keyboard proficiency is required, although previous organ study is not necessary. The POE (Advanced) is designed for teenagers who have already attended a POE, or who are already receiving private instruction. Scholarship assistance is available.

The POE+ is a summer program filled with practical information and instruction for adult pianists and other musicians interested in improving their serviceplaying skills. Participants will be introduced to basic organ skills through private instruction and classes. The week-long experience will lead to greater confidence and competence at the organ.

POE and POE+ site locations are selected by the AGO Committee on the New Organist and approved by the AGO National Council after application by AGO host chapters. The deadline for applications to host 2009 POE and POE+ programs is March 15, 2008. Applications are available from AGO National Headquarters. ## Frederick Swann to be Honored at AGO Recital and Gala Benefit Reception in Los Angeles

## Peninsula AGO Chapter Nov. 11, 2007 Members' Recital at First Congregational Church in Palo Alto

HANKS TO ORGANIST/ASSISTANT MUSIC DIRECTOR Joe Guthrie and the First Congregational Church of Palo Alto, our Chapter members got a chance to test-drive the brand new Létourneau organ, Op. 101 (2007) on November 11th, only a few weeks after Dr. John Walker played the September 29th Dedication Recital.

This recital was a relaxed and informal setting for our members both to try out this instrument and also to perform for colleagues, family, and friends. It was an especially nice opportunity for members who don't often get the chance to perform publicly. Our members' repertoire included a generous helping of J. S. Bach but also spanned the centuries with Buxtehude, Mendelssohn, Franck, Widor, Duruflé, Messiaen, and Manz. Afterwards, members of the church hosted a reception with delicious food and drink in the narthex.

This versatile three-manual, 49-stop instrument allows registration of a widely diverse repertoire. The performances reflected the organ's delightfully eclectic design: each composition evoked the characteristic "sound" of its era. In addition, the organ's own timbre, combined with first-rate acoustics, made for a wonderful listening experience.

First Congregational's music department, co-Directors Gregory and Kathy Wait and Joe Guthrie, oversaw an architectural and acoustic transformation that included a complete redesign of the chancel along with the organ installation. It is an outstanding performance space: the results speak—or rather sing—for themselves! Los Angeles, and organ artist-in-residence at St. Margaret's Episcopal Church in Palm Desert, California. In addition to his prominent church positions (Riverside Church, New York City [1957– 82], Crystal Cathedral [1982–98] and First Congregational Church of Los Angeles [1998–2001]), he was for ten years chairman of the organ department at the Manhattan School of Music and served on the faculties of the School of Sacred Music at Union Theological Seminary and Teacher's College of Columbia University.

In addition to solo recitals in churches, cathedrals, and concert halls throughout North America and many foreign countries, Mr. Swann performs frequently with symphony orchestras and choral groups. His numerous published works and recordings and his wide experience as an organ consultant have added to his visibility in the organ and choral worlds. Although in semi-retirement since 2001, Mr. Swann remains active in all aspects of his long and illustrious career. Among recent honors were his election in 2002 as Performer of the Year by the New York City Chapter of the American Guild of Organists; in the fall of 2004 he was selected to play the Inaugural Recital on the spectacular new organ in the Walt Disney Concert Hall in Los Angeles.
