> Turkish Snowballs Courtesy of the Institute for Integrative Nutrition 1 cup almonds ¹/₂ c Medjool dates, pits removed Juice and zest of 1 lemon Pinch of sea salt 1 tsp of rosewater (optional) 1 cup of raw, shredded coconut

In a food processor, blend the almonds until they are a course meal. Add dates, lemon juice and zest, and salt. Blend thoroughly. Taste, then adjust accordingly. Using damp hands, form small bite-sized balls. Place coconut on plate and roll the balls in it to lightly cover them. Serve at room temperature or chilled. May be stored in the freezer.

Review of Composers' Forum

On Saturday June 6 at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Palo Alto, members of our chapter played their compositions for a small group of us. Douglas Franks, Ethan Haman, T. Paul Rosas, Robert Train Adams (from the San Francisco chapter), Jim Welch, and Angela Kraft Cross all played pieces they had written, or were written for them!

Doug Franks demonstrated the festive intros and special last verse hymn accompaniment arrangements he has written for Augsburg Press's Supporting Resource series, titled "Introductions and Alternate Accompaniments for Organ" (Doug's arrangements appear in volumes 3, 4, 8, 9, and 10). He played and we sang for LANCASHIRE ("Lead on, O King eternal"), HAMBURG ("When I survey the wondrous cross"), SALZBURG ("Let the whole creation cry"). AUSTRIA ("Praise the Lord, O heavens!"), and FINLANDIA ("This is my song"). These were very good and accessible introductions, and the special last verses make the hymns very festive indeed. The FINLANDIA accompaniment had 2 octave pedal scale passages at the last verse, broadening out the ending. We were very impressed that one of our members is published in such a well known series with such wide church use.

Another composer present, Bob Adams, offered piano accompaniments for LANCASHIRE in the piano accompaniment books published by the same publisher.

Ethan Haman, our youngest member, played a Trumpet March he had composed. It had a catchy tune and nice rhythm, and was conceived as a variation on Purcell's pieces by the same name. We went away singing his new tune and marveled again at his abilities!

Paul Rosas said he got on a meditation kick, and played his 2 meditations for us, His second was based on what he learned at our chapter's improvisation workshop led by John Karl Hirten on Saturday May 9. Rani had done some chord patterns of holding notes at that workshop, which he used in this piece. He also played an accompaniment for WONDROUS LOVE designed to be sung by a duet of two amateur singers. It offered good support for singers not too sure of holding their parts with a very nice accompaniment. Then he played an in-progress composition based on patterns from a weaving book, titled "Annabelle Toccata". It was very interesting to hear how he acquired and applied the themes from the weaving patterns. He's now taking composition lessons from John Karl Hirten. Bob Adams commented that this kind of pattern is the "Moment Form" used by Stravinsky, and talked about deriving some of his own composition patterns from knitting patterns (even pulling out a knitted vest in progress!).

Bob Adams played a composition he wrote for Pentecost titled "And They Were Filled with the Holy Spirit." The piece had a lot of fourths, with whole-tone scales in the pedals to give a sense of the event being depicted. "Consistent dissonance" is how he described his piece, "not aiming for comfortable," written in 7/8 to describe the spirit of movement of Pentecost. The piece had a very abrupt ending, to show the Holy Spirit is still at work.

Jim Welch played a piece by Rulon Christiansen whose specialty is French Romantic music. The Scherzo was dedicated to him—they had met at BYU. This piece is romantic in style, with shades of Vierne and Dupré.

Angela Kraft Cross played a piece she wrote last summer titled "Homage to Henri Nouwen; House of Fear, House of Love." Nouwen was a Belgian priest and author who died in 1996. The title of this piece is from a quote of Nouwen: "Out of the House of fear into the House of Love." The first part of the piece, "Fear" is a Prelude-Sonata, with nervous anxious dissonances. The development is not in the expected order, with themes constantly interrupted. The second part of the piece is a fugue on "God's Love," which stabilizes into a quiet lyrical section before heading to a fugal climax. See more of her notes below.

Notes on "Homage to Henri Nouwen"

For many years, I have felt motivated to write a piece honoring the great theologian, Henri Nouwen. Henri Nouwen was a Catholic priest from Holland who then completed his doctoral studies at University of Notre Dame in Indiana. He has taught on the divinity faculties of Notre Dame, Harvard and Yale. He never felt completely comfortable in the ivory tower, and took many sabbaticals including mission work to Central America, 6 months of solitude in a Trappist monastery, and eventually the last 10 years of his life as the chaplain to a home for developmentally disabled adults in Canada. He is best known to most of us, however because of his spiritual books, which show profound insight and a brilliant theological mind. One of my favorite books is Lifesigns, and in that book I especially love the preface entitled Out of the House of Fear into the House of Love. Nouwen maintains that human institutions, be it government, work, school, even the human part of church use fear to motivate us where as God is different. God uses Love to motivate us. Jesus is quoted again and again as saying "Be not afraid!"

Homage to Henri Nouwen is a Prelude and Fugue where the prelude is called House of Fear and the fugue, House of Love. The Prelude is built in Sonata form with the main theme having a spooky feel, the secondary theme being a worry wart anxiety theme, and the closing theme, a startling feeling. After the development section, the Recap brings the themes back, but since fear fragments us, the themes interrupt each other continuously for the remainder of the prelude. The fugue, inspired by Durufle's Fugue on the name of Alain, starts quietly in the Aeolian mode, and as God's love buoys up our life and gives us stability, the mode progresses through the piece to more optimistic and uplifting modes, Mixolydian, Ionian (major) and Lydian, as the registration builds to a full organ. The fugue also is written in the Samba dance rhythm to give God's love a playful lilt.

Overall the goal of my piece is to bring attention to Henri Nouwen's wonderful writings. They have changed my life, and they are likely to inspire yours as well!
