On Sunday April 18, we are holding a Certification Fair at my church, St. Bede's. This is an open house for resources on how to achieve AGO certification, e.g., Service-Playing, CAGO. 
Wishing you every success and happiness in the coming year. See you on January 24!

# **REDWOOD CITY ORGAN RESTORED**

Chuck Broaddus, a deacon at Redwood Baptist Church, reports that since a fire there the organ there (a Moller) has not been played. However, they have recently restored power to the blower and the organ is now working and has been tuned. (The damage to the rest of the auditorium from the fire has been completely repaired and the renovations have been completed.)

Mr. Broaddus is enthusiastic for the instrument to be played, and is able to make it available for practice or concerts. The auditorium seats about 500, and has 50 foot ceilings with huge pilaster arches over the seating area. The seating is made up of pew chairs that can be reconfigured however desired. The church also has a recording studio located in the basement (sound proofed, digital recording equipment), so it might be possible to do live recordings from the auditorium to the studio. One interesting feature of the auditorium is that there is a large rock on the preaching platform. This rock was present at the site when the church was built and apparently the architect decided it would be less expensive to build around the rock rather than try to break it out.
