### Songful Summer in the South of England by Douglas Franks

The Southern Cathedrals Festival, an annual organ and choral extravaganza in southern England, worked its magic this past summer in the historic city of Winchester. Alternating between Salisbury, Chichester, and Winchester, the SCF showcases the choirs of men and boys from the cathedrals in these three cities, as well as the girl choristers from Winchester and Salisbury. The organists of the host cathedral get a real workout as accompanists for the concerts and for the numerous choral worship services that make up much of the festival.

Two major choral concerts, a celebrity organ recital, choral liturgies, and a couple of workshops formed the bulk of this year's festival. Pleasantly around the edges were receptions, festival luncheons, afternoon teas, a used-music sale, and several exhibits, including the King James Bible Exhibition and one by the Friends of Cathedral Music, an organization that promotes and sustains music programs in churches and cathedrals throughout the UK.

Andrew Lumsden, Director of Music at Winchester Cathedral, is to be heartily congratulated for the superhuman job he did of preparing and conducting an incredible quantity of music, all performed at the very highest level. His colleagues Sarah Baldock and David Halls, music directors at Chichester and Salisbury cathedrals respectively, helped considerably, but he was the real hero of the festival. Also to be commended are the festival's principal organists, Simon Bell and Richard McVeigh, who accompanied the choral performances and served as organists for the many choral services. In addition to their flawless liturgical support, they provided stirring mini-recitals as preludes and postludes.

An organ recital by James O'Donnell, Organist and Master of the Choristers at Westminster Abbey in London, led off the festival. His demanding program included works of Mendelssohn, Bach, Alain (whose 100th birthday we celebrate this year), Messiaen, Franck, and Liszt (whose 200th birthday we celebrate this year). "Miroir," a delightful, sparkling piece by Dutch composer Ad Wammes, stood in whimsical counterpoint to the major literature Mr. O'Donnell played. His recital was followed by a sublimely beautiful Compline service, a blissful blend of plainsong and polyphony. The next concert featured the girl choristers of Salisbury and Winchester singing with the lay clerks of the three cathedral choirs. Their

program was an elegant collection of pieces by Tallis, Palestrina, Sheppard, Bach, Elgar, Peter Hurford, Sebastian Forbes, and John Rutter, punctuated by several organ solos. The repertoire stuck close to the overarching theme of Pentecost. The closing piece, "Come Down, O Love Divine" by John Rutter, was indeed divine and had to spark a whole new respect for Rutter's compositional talents. The final notes of the piece--hence of the whole concert--were a sustained major second sung by two girl choristers with a barely audible underpinning by the chorus. Haunting in an unexpected yet satisfying way.

The closing concert on the final evening of the festival was presented by the boys and lay clerks of the three "southern" cathedrals joined by the Fine Arts Brass, a full complement of approximately ten brass players. Simon Bell played organ. The three festival directors took turns conducting. The brass players were a powerful lot, and Andrew Lumsden in particular tried valiantly to keep them in balance with chorus and organ. Anthony Holborne's "Suite for Brass" showed them at their best, that is, all on their own.

The same concert featured a world premiere of a festival commission composed by Philip Moore (formerly of Gloucester Cathedral), "At the Round Earth's Imagined Corners." Mr. Moore cleverly combined choirs, brass, and organ in this dramatic triptych. The immense dynamic range of the piece, its surging rhythmic energy, and how the different forces played off each other kept us listeners raptly attentive. The composer was present and enjoyed the audience's enthusiastic acknowledgment at the conclusion of the performance.

Came Sunday morning, the choirs had dispersed to their respective cathedrals, and the 2011 Southern Cathedrals Festival was over. One could only look back in reflective awe at the quantity of choral and organ music the choirs, directors, and organists rehearsed and performed with such poise and perfection. Standing out above all others for his monumental labors was Andrew Lumsden. My congratulations go out to him from afar. With directors like him at the helm, it's no wonder the Southern Cathedrals Festival continues to flourish and rank as one of Europe's major summer music festivals.
