FROM THE DEAN

Dear Chapter Colleagues:

"People look east, the time is near of the crowning of the year." So begins the familiar Advent carol written by Eleanor Farjeon (also the author of "Morning Has Broken") in 1928.



Her verse continues "Make your house fair as you are able, trim the hearth and set the table;" however, I suspect that for many of us choir directors and organists this time of year is one for programming repertoire, practicing voluntaries, and rehearsing singers—and that our hearth and table barely get noticed in the busy weeks before Christmas!

So is the peculiar seasonality of our work, and although I wish you all the very best in your holiday musical preparations, I also invite you to look forward to summer, a season when we are generally less busy. Specifically, I encourage you to consider being part of the 2012 AGO National Convention taking place July 1st-6th in Nashville, Tennessee. Registration is now open online at www.ago2012.org, and before February 15th is available at a discounted rate of \$350 (\$300 for seniors, \$200 for students)—plus \$130 for the bus package. I will be there, and hope you will join me.

I realize that when you include the expense of a hotel and air travel, attending a national convention comes at a sizeable cost; however, I do urge you to consider the benefits of a week of world-class organ and choral performances, workshops that teach practical skills, a unique set of exhibits by music publishers, and the opportunity to meet colleagues from around the world. Although most congregation's budgets are tight, I encourage you to ask for a modest professional development allowance to make your attendance more manageable; if that's not an option, remember that your expenses in attending will often be tax-deductible.

Since my last newsletter article we have enjoyed two marvelous chapter events: a spectacular recital by Adam Detzner (who will be performing in Nashville) and a superb master class by Frederic Blanc. Attendance at both these events was very strong, due in no small part to the tremendous work of our Sub-Dean David Sheetz, to whom I am tremendously grateful. The first two programs of the new year promise to be equally spectacular: a master class on the Stanford organs with Robert Huw Morgan on January 9th, and a repertory-sharing afternoon on February 11th in the idyllic Woodside Village Church. Please join us!

The second verse of Farjeon's carol reads: "Furrows be glad, though earth is bare, one more seed is planted there; give up your strength the seed to nourish, that in course the flower may flourish." I trust that your strength will sustain you through this busy time, and that you and those you touch through your music-making will flourish in the new year. May it be a time for renewal, growth, delight, and discovery for us all.


