FROM THE DEAN

Samuel Soria has been organist of the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels since its dedication in 2002. He came to Los Angeles from the Cathedral of the Holy Name in Chicago. Mr. Soria is a graduate of Valparaiso University and Northwestern University. In addition to academic study with Philip

Gehring and Wolfgang Rübsam, he has coached privately with Jean Guillou, Naji Hakim, Paul Manz, and Cherry Rhodes.

Soria was a prizewinner in the 1993 J.S. Bach International Competition at the Kennedy Center, Washington, D.C. In 1996 he was a prizewinner in the AGO National Competition in Organ Improvisation at Trinity Church, Wall Street, New York, having been a semifinalist in this same competition in 1992. He has also been awarded the honor of being the first American invited to Knokke-Heist, Belgium as a participant in the European Competition in Organ Improvisation in 1995.

Soria has recorded two CDs for the noted classical label Delos International. Both CDs, "Premier Organ Recording" and "Organ Voices," have received national critical acclaim. A third Delos CD featuring organ improvisations is forthcoming.

In July of 2004, he was a featured artist for the national convention of the American Guild of Organists at the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels. In July of 2011, he was a featured artist for the regional convention of the American Guild of Organists in San Francisco. His work has been broadcast nationally on the Minnesota Public radio program "Pipedreams." Soria continues a rigorous schedule of religious services, festivals, concerts, and recitals at the cathedral in addition to performances and workshops across the U.S.A.

ELECTRONICS AT STUDENT CONTESTS AND CONCERTS Lea Schmidt-Rogers Councillor for Professional Development AGO Region IX

Cell phone videos, video cameras, iPad videos. Next, probably taking videos with a special pair of glasses. It's gone way beyond banning flash cameras.

Many music organizations are pondering the intrusion of electronics on the scene. In our National Federation of Music Clubs, there is a new notice in the syllabus for Junior Festival (ages 0-18) that no electronics period (this includes but is not limited to cell phones, video cameras, and iPads), may be used in the festival performance rooms. Our Music Teachers' Association of California is presently deliberating its policy, receiving pressure from parents to continue to allow videos in festivals and contests.

Up front, I have to admit that I'm extremely biased against cameras in contests, recitals, and concerts. Being a church organist, I've seen the worst: cameramen filming directly in front of the bride and groom, flash cameras going off so much that you can hardly hear the pronouncement of marriage, videographers demanding to be front and center blocking everyone's view, cell phones going off during prayers, baptisms, and sermons. Even at a recent AGO convention, I was behind a camera phone raised so that I couldn't see the performer. Also at a recent workshop, one AGO member was texting the entire time (maybe he was taking notes?).

Here are some thoughts on the banning of electronics:

Professionalism: We are training our students to play and act in a professional manner. Photography and videotaping are not allowed in symphony halls or during any kind of solo or ensemble concerts.

Privacy: Many parents or teachers are filming others besides their own children or students. That's just not polite, and could be illegal. In many states, depending upon several factors, taking photographs or videotaping of a minor

requires the permission of the minor's parent or guardian.

In the moment: If a student is thinking about how many notes he/she will miss and have to see on the video, she is less likely to be as spontaneous and exciting. While taping is an excellent learning tool, it is more meaningful to use it, as such, before a contest or concert. Also, by constantly photographing our students, are we teaching them good values? We should be instructing them that focusing on the music is more important than focusing on the performer.

Courtesy: Raising a phone camera in an audience or setting up a video camera in the middle of an aisle is disturbing someone else's listening experience.

All of these gadgets are so much fun, but let's learn how to use them responsibly in the right place and at the right time.
