FROM THE DEAN

Dear Chapter Colleagues:

I write this just a few days after enjoying Sandra Soderlund's workshop on "Touch and Technique." It was so nice to see a mixture of organists of all ages, from



within our chapter and outside it, come together for a time of learning from somebody with such a wealth of experience studying and teaching our instrument. We were all given much to think about in our performance of repertoire of all periods! I was also delighted to see (and hear the organ at) Grace Lutheran Church for the first time. One of the executive committee's goals over the past two years has been to include as many new (or at least not recently visited) venues for our chapter programs, which has helped us to more closely connect with our colleagues and congregations. If you know of a mid-Peninsula church with an organ that we have not visited in recent years, please let David Sheetz or a member of the executive committee know!

It's hard to believe that eighteen months have passed since Adam Detzner won our chapter's 2011 AGO/Quimby Regional Competition for Young Organists, before going on to win the Region IX competition in San Francisco. I'm delighted to announce that the executive committee has approved our hosting a competition next year as well—to be held on Saturday, March 23. If you know of young (under 24 as of August 1, 2013) organists who might enjoy the challenge of this competition, please let them know. Entrants must either live or go to school in Region IX, which comprises California, Arizona, Hawaii, Nevada, Utah, Korea, Singapore, Sydney, and Taiwan. More information and an application will be available in The American Organist.

Speaking of our magazine, I was thrilled to see an article by our own Keith Wannamaker in September's edition. "Out with the New and in with the Old: Recycling an Organ Console"

describes Keith's adventurous and innovative conversion of a forty-year old electro-pneumatic console to an electronic MIDI instrument. In the past I've often been surprised that, in spite of our chapter's home in Silicon Valley, we've not been closer to the technological cutting edge of our profession—but no longer, thanks to Keith!

Mindful of Thanksgiving next month, I want to conclude this article by expressing my thanks to all those who—in so many different ways—enable our chapter to do so much more than one would expect its size to permit. Out of our sixty members, fourteen gave donations along with their membership renewals this year, ranging from \$10 to \$200, for a total of \$631. Since we as a chapter only receive about \$37 from each member, this is the income equivalent of seventeen additional members! Simply put, we would not be able to offer the range and quantity of programs we do were it not for your generosity—thank you!

Equally importantly, we are reliant on an enormous volunteer base within our chapter, this year more than ever. In addition to ten executive committee members who carry out their duties with devotion and diligence, we have an entirely separate (by design!) committee working hard to plan next year's Pipe Organ Encounter. If—somehow—you're not part of either of these groups, please consider how you might be able to help when they call for volunteers. But most of all, thank you for all that you do to support our profession and our community in whatever capacity you feel called to serve!

Meet Nathan Laube

A star among young classical musicians, concert organist Nathan J. Laube has quickly earned a place amongst the organ world's elite performers. His brilliant playing, creative programming, and gracious demeanor have thrilled audiences and presenters across the United States and in Europe, and have earned high praise from critics and peers alike.

Upcoming and recent performances by Mr. Laube include major venues in the United States and Europe. Mr. Laube was a featured performer at the 2009 and 2011 national conventions of the Organ Historical Society. In 2010 he performed at the national convention of the American Guild of Organists in Washington, DC; in 2012 he was a featured artist at the AGO national convention in Nashville, Tennessee, where he performed in a concert for organ and orchestra at the Schermerhorn Symphony Center.

Mr. Laube began a graduate degree program in the fall of 2011 at the Musikhochschule in Stuttgart, Germany as a student of Ludger Lohmann. In addition he holds the position of Artist in Residence at the American Cathedral of the Holy Trinity in Paris, France, commuting frequently between Stuttgart and Paris to play for services there as his schedule allows.

The recipient of the coveted William Fulbright Grand, Nathan spent the 2010-2011 academic year studying with Michel Bouvard at the Conservatoire à Rayonnement Régional de Toulouse where he earned the Prix de Spécialisé with the mention "Très Bien" and "Féliciations du Jury"—the two top honors. The year included study on some of France's most venerable historic pipe organs in churches and cathedrals across the country, in addition to studying harpsichord and fortepiano with Yasuko Uyama-Bouvard and early music with Jan Willem Jansen.

A native of Chicago, Nathan earned his Bachelor of Music degree at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, where he studied organ with Alan Morrison and piano with Susan Starr. Upon graduation, he received the institute's two highest awards: the Landis Award for Excellence in Academics and the Aldwell Award for Excellence in Musical Studies. Early studies in Chicago were with Donna Fortney (piano), Dr. Elizabeth Naegele (organ), and Dr. Louis Playford (piano and music theory) at the Chicago Academy for the Arts.

Nathan was awarded first place in the National Albert Schweitzer Organ Competition in September 2004, and in the Chicago AGO/Quimby Regional

Competition for Young Organists in February 2007.

Although Nathan's vast repertoire spans the works of pre-Baroque to living composers, he has become known for his colorful and virtuoso transcriptions of orchestral works by Liszt, Mendelssohn, Mahler, Rossini, and Strauss. As an Assistant Organist to Peter Richard Conte at the Wanamaker Grand Court Organ—the world's largest and ultimate "transcription organ"—Nathan performed regularly on the daily recital schedule. In 2005 he appeared on WRTI Radio's broadcast of "The Wanamaker Organ Hour" playing many of his original transcriptions.

Nathan's other interests include medieval and modern architecture, gardening, international travel, exotic cuisine and cooking, as well as sketching and drawing.

Nathan Laube will be the presenter for our November meeting, Tuesday, November 13th at 7:00 p.m., First Congregational Church in Palo Alto. He will also perform a recital at Stanford Memorial Church, Wednesday, November 14th at 8:00 p.m.
