For the last eight months I have gone twice a week to a dermatology clinic in Fremont. Every Tuesday and Thursday I sign in for my appointment, always careful to arrive a few minutes early because A). The place runs on a tight schedule, and B). I rarely have a good excuse to be late. I wait awhile, and then a nurse calls me into the exam room, where she blasts patches of my skin with a special laser gun in an attempt to restore the color that I've lost to vitiligo. The concentrated UVB light burns my skin at first, but it eventually tans; and so, slowly but surely, the melanin returns where it was once eaten away by a protective but overly vigilant immune system.

The clinic employs three laser nurses, though most of my appointments are with two of them. Even though the appointments are brief, we've learned a few things about each other these past several months. "Did you do anything fun this weekend?" one of them asks as she calibrates the laser machine one Tuesday morning.

"I played for church on Sunday," I reply, "but that was about it."

Now she's curious. She has a kid who plays percussion in band. Maybe she played in band herself back in the day—I can't quite remember if she's told me that or not. Though she isn't a professional musician, she clearly appreciates music, so I tell her a little bit about what I do as a substitute organist. "It's basically freelance work," I say. "Sometimes, when a church's organist is gone for vacation or otherwise unavailable, they'll contact me and ask if I can fill in for them."

"So you don't have to be busy every weekend, and you can choose when you want to play?"

"Basically."

What I don't tell her is that I'm also employed once or twice a month at a church in Los Gatos. We have Christmas coming up, and it's all hands on deck for Christmas Eve. What she doesn't know is that I will play the 10:00 PM Christmas Eve service there, and then, at 9:00 AM the following morning—while she drinks coffee in her robe and slippers, and her kids unwrap the presents that Santa left for them under the tree—I have another service to play for at the VA hospital, because I'm a sucker for sick veterans at Christmas.

In most other writings about the holiday season, this should be the point where I include a sentimental cliché about stepping back from one's busy schedule and enjoying the spirit of

Christmas. But we are organists, and this is Advent. While others can sit back and enjoy their chestnuts roasting on an open fire (or, in the case of my devoutly Baptist grandparents, a glass of hard eggnog), we have work to do. It is nothing less than a calling to be an organist, but we still have work to do. As we enter the Advent season, perhaps we can experience the joy of this time of year without dismissing all the time and effort that we put into it. Just remember:

Christ is born.

Keep your head, arms, and legs inside the ride at all times, and Merry Christmas.
